PARKS TOOLKIT: ANIMAL AMBASSADORS

open doors into
people's minds
and hearts. The



experience of encountering another living being, especially when that encounter is up close and personal, draws people in and invites them to be curious. Up close encounters also allow us to provide a safe space for people to conquer their fear of species like snakes. But the biggest and most valuable result of using animal ambassadors is their ability to build connections with people emotionally – they are called ambassadors after all!

We're going to take a look at how we use animal ambassadors using the example of our Eastern Screech-Owl Mike. Our top priority whenever we use any animal is safety, so we always make sure Mike is secured using falconry supplies called almars and jesses, and a leash. We also always handle Mike with gloves to protect ourselves. Then we rely on the relationship we have built with Mike to maintain his trust in us so he feels safe around other people. This unseen work then allows us to take Mike out and about to engage the public in conversations about owl biology, bird conservation, and wildlife rehabilitation. Mike, and the rest of the animal ambassadors on our team, work magic when it comes to making our programs relevant and provoking. All we have to do during the program is introduce the animal and focus on safety, the animal and the program participants lead the way from there. Hopefully, you all will get the chance to meet Mike soon!
