Gearing up for Maple Sugaring

When winter weather hits that magical mix when it's below freezing at night and above freezing during the day, something sweet starts happening in the woods at The Narrows Reserve – the sugar maples wake up, and so do we!

Armed with taps, buckets, tubing, and a lot of enthusiasm, our naturalist team and maple sugaring participants drill small spouts into sugar maples and watch the sap start to drip. It looks like plain water, but it's liquid potential! The real excitement kicks in at the evaporator, where that sap is boiled down for hours. And here's the head-turning part: it takes about 40 gallons of sap to make just ONE gallon of syrup!

Last year, GCP&T produced three gallons of pure maple syrup, which means we collected and processed well over 100 gallons of sap. That's a whole lot of dripping buckets, steaming kettles, and evaporation!

It's more than a tradition—it's an adventure in patience, science, and sticky-fingered reward. Stay tuned on our socials for more to come about the 2026 Maple Sugaring programs!
